Overview

The <u>U.S. Department of Justice</u> (DOJ), <u>Office of Justice Programs</u> (OJP), <u>Bureau of Justice Assistance</u> (BJA) seeks applications for funding to provide training and technical assistance to prosecutors across the country. This program furthers the DOJ's mission by assisting prosecutors to develop innovative and effective strategies to improve public safety.

This solicitation incorporates guidance provided in the <u>OJP Grant Application Resource Guide</u> which provides additional information for applicants to prepare and submit applications to OJP for funding. If this solicitation expressly modifies any provision in the OJP Grant Application Resource Guide, the applicant is to follow the guidelines in this solicitation as to that provision.

Program Description

Overview

OJP is committed to advancing work that promotes civil rights and racial equity, increases access to justice, supports crime victims and individuals impacted by the justice system, strengthens community safety and protects the public from crime and evolving threats, and builds trust between law enforcement and the community.

With this solicitation, BJA seeks to select one provider to deliver, nationwide, a wide range of training and technical assistance (TTA) services to prosecutorial agencies participating in the Innovative Prosecution Solutions (IPS) Program. These services include, but are not limited to, training and educational sessions by relevant subject matter experts, onsite or remote guidance on problem analysis, solution development, data analysis, prosecution theory, evaluation methodology, and other matters relevant to the purposes of the IPS Program. IPS Program agencies will leverage these TTA services to implement innovative and effective solutions to pressing safety and prosecutorial agency challenges, enhancing the quality of their IPS projects.

Statutory Authority

Funding for this program is anticipated under the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program. The JAG Program authorization provides that up to 5 percent of the funds available to carry out subpart 1 of Title I, Part E of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 ("Omnibus") may be granted, among other reasons, for one or more of the purposes specified in 34 U.S.C. § 10152 upon a determination that it is necessary "to combat, address, or otherwise respond to precipitous or extraordinary increases in crime, or in a type or types of crime." 34 U.S.C. § 10157(b)(1). Awards under this solicitation are made under statutory authority provided by the Consolidated Appropriations Act FY 2023.

Specific Information

The IPS Program encourages prosecutors to use data in the development of their public safety strategies and programs. As such, it builds upon analysis-driven, promising practices, and evidence-based prosecution by encouraging state, local, and tribal prosecutorial agencies to develop effective, economical, and innovative responses to crime within their jurisdictions.

Under this solicitation, BJA is seeking a TTA provider with extensive TTA expertise, experience, and knowledge to support IPS Program site-based grantees explore new solutions to public safety concerns as well as address the internal operational and organizational challenges faced by prosecutor's offices. BJA expects the TTA partner to work closely with BJA and the individual IPS Program sites to ensure their efforts are effective and successful. Throughout the program sites' projects, the TTA partner will provide them with opportunities to participate in information-sharing sessions, facilitate peer-to-peer exchanges of information, provide access to relevant subject matter expertise, and produce reports on the lessons learned from the IPS Program community of practice.

BJA oversees a large and active portfolio of training and technical assistance. Because this award will be made as a cooperative agreement, BJA staff and leadership will manage the

award in close consultation with the awarded TTA provider, using the following principles as guidance:

Informed by data, the needs of the field, and research to provide efficient and consistent delivery of services, TTA partners will actively gather input from grantees and the field and data on relevant crime issues to inform the approach and the TTA plan's feasibility. Any proposed approaches will employ adult learning theory and research on effective practices, and they should leverage technology to enhance the quality of services.

To reach members of the field where they are and reach a broader audience, TTA partners will ensure that their TTA strategies are fair, flexible, and can be useful for persons and agencies with varying levels of capacity and experience. TTA partners will have a diverse team of members who can effectively work with the field and bring creative ideas to expanding the impact of BJA's TTA.

To assess the TTA's impact and make refinements to better accomplish their goals, TTA partners will have a plan to ensure their TTA strategies are implemented with fidelity, and they will assess how well those being served are engaged and applying what is learned. The partners will evaluate the intended outcome to make refinements to their approach.

By anticipating BJA processes and approvals to proactively manage and share updates and current and relevant information with the field and grantees, TTA partners will use a proactive project management approach to ensure (1) the planning and problem solving are accomplishing grantees' goals; (2) BJA and its grantees are kept up to date on all progress made; (3) all TTA is coordinated closely with other BJA partners; and (4) TTA providers make effective use of funds. In addition, the TTA partners must make all resources available to the field in addition to grantees, and they must proactively market their resources.

Goals, Objectives, and Deliverables

Goals

Provide ongoing TTA (both remotely and onsite) to existing and future IPS Program grantees.

Advance prosecution practices for the benefit of the entire field through the dissemination of promising practices and evaluation findings focused on improving public safety and types of crime that are increasing.

Objectives

The IPS TTA partner will provide training, technical assistance, and guidance that addresses the management, organizational, and project implementation needs of the IPS Program grantees. This can include mentoring by other experts on program implementation and management. At a minimum, the TTA provider will ensure that its efforts are framed around supporting the development of each IPS Program site's strategy for instituting and testing unique approaches to chronic and/or emerging crime problems and its capacity to achieve results.

The TTA provider will also support prosecutors in leading collaborations with their criminal justice partners and developing strategies focused on improving public safety and reducing violent crime, such as:

- Developing ways to identify those who commit the most violent and repeat offenses/and or using data to develop prosecution strategies with law enforcement.
- Assisting prosecutors with best practices to identify low risk individuals and mechanisms for diversion.
- Using crime analysis tools, through strategies like GunStat, to track violence involving the criminal use of a firearm.
- Enhancing the prosecutor's role in investigations of homicide cases and cybercrime strategies to improve public safety.
- Working with the police department and the United States Attorney to investigate and prosecute human trafficking cases.

Deliverables

The TTA must focus on projects and sites that are experiencing a precipitous increase in crime. To that end, the IPS TTA partner will:

Develop a plan to assess and support individual IPS Program sites' and their research partners' TTA needs, including their capacity to perform sophisticated data and technology analysis. The plan should detail a framework, methodologies, and timeline that will be used to guide the problem analysis and implementation phases of each site's IPS strategy. At a minimum, the plan will ensure that assistance is available to grantees related to: use of data to validate the nature and extent of crime and drivers of crime, an evaluation methodology, research partnership management, the identification and employment of promising and evidence-based practices, and strategic communication planning for the implementation phase. The plan should also discuss how the TTA provider will evaluate its TTA (e.g., follow-up surveys, pre-, post- phone data collection), how peer-to-peer learning opportunities will be encouraged across sites, and how specialized assistance will be provided to strategize on responses to precipitous increases in crime, where applicable.

Propose a process to identify and deliver tailored TTA plans to existing and future IPS Program sites and their research partners, including the proposed method of TTA delivery, and timeline for delivery. Any TTA plans must be approved by both BJA and the grantee before implementation, and they must address how the TTA program will assist individual sites in sustaining and expanding the use of successful strategies. Once the TTA plans are approved, implement the TTA plan, providing timely and high quality services consistent with the plan. Coordinate with BJA in ongoing analysis and refinement to the TTA efforts, assist BJA with an ongoing assessment of IPS Program sites' progress, and work with BJA to review the final project evaluation reports as well as other deliverables.

Describe a plan to assist individual IPS grantee organizations in disseminating

information and updates about their IPS goals, practices, and project progress throughout their organizations. Such plans should address how the TTA provider will facilitate consistent project information sharing with key agency components throughout the lives of the individual IPS projects in order to increase knowledge and understanding of the value of research and evidence-based practices at all levels of the prosecutorial organization.

Recruit, maintain, and use a pool of diverse subject matter experts to assist with TTA delivery and provide any needed expertise or guidance on a range of issues, including, but not limited to, crime issues, crime and data analysis, technology, crime strategy units, intelligence, alternatives to incarceration, violence reduction, research partnership development, research and methodology design, identification of available data sources, data analysis, facilitating partnerships with relevant stakeholders, technology implementation, performance metrics, the review of grantee deliverables, and the dissemination of best practices and research findings. NOTE: Applicants must identify—by name—a cadre of subject matter experts in each of these areas and their expertise by providing their previous experience and what assistance will be provided to the sites.

In close coordination with BJA, plan and conduct national and/or regional meetings, workshops, or other educational sessions for existing and former IPS Program sites during the 24-month project period. BJA asks that applicants propose a plan for meetings that best aligns with their overall TTA approach.

Create and maintain a dynamic, up-to-date, and interactive platform for digital and other forms of media, to include the maintenance of the IPS website, online newsletter, webinars, social media, videos, and blogs. Provide online resources, materials, and limited assistance (via phone or email) that is available to both IPS Program sites, prosecutorial agencies, and the general public regarding IPS, lessons learned, and related issues. Describe how these materials and the web platform will be kept current in terms of substantive information and technology. Access, review, preserve existing IPS materials and literature, and transition, as necessary, to an upgraded and/or new web-based platform under the new cooperative agreement. All products must be American Disabilities Act Section 508 compliant.

Upon BJA's recommendation and ensuing approval, meet and collaborate with other BJA programs and other federal agencies to enhance resources and knowledge, as well as leverage the respective expertise of the partners to respond to the needs of the field and to collaborate and coordinate services and technical support across offices and departments.

Create a resources and product production plan that aligns with the TTA delivery plan and considers how to best reach the IPS Program sites, including hard copy materials and web-based resources. BJA strongly encourages the use of distance learning opportunities such as webinars.

Create and produce various documents and materials that highlight a wide range of IPS Program site accomplishments, research reports, and results to be shared across a broad spectrum of audiences (for example, other IPS Program sites, criminal justice

researchers, and policymakers). Describe what these materials might be and how they will be widely disseminated and contribute to the translation of research findings into prosecution practice.

Host weekly update meetings with and submit bi-monthly progress reports to BJA for the duration of the IPS TTA grant, using a consistent format that summarizes the major activities and accomplishments during the reporting period, and provide significant findings and events, problems encountered, suggested solutions, and staff used for each project task. The provider will also specify in the reports the extent to which the project is on schedule. To track the project's status, maintain an online project management tool that both BJA and project staff can view.

The Goals, Objectives, and Deliverables are directly related to the performance measures that show the completed work's results, as discussed in the "Application and Submission Information" section.

Evidence-Based Programs or Practices

This abstract should be in paragraph form without bullets or tables, written in the third person, and exclude personally identifiable information. Abstracts will be made publicly available on the OJP and USASpending.gov websites if the project is awarded. See the OJP Grant Application Resource Guide for an example of a proposal abstract.

Proposal Narrative

The Proposal Narrative should be submitted as an attachment in JustGrants. The attached document should be double-spaced, using a standard 12-point font; have no less than 1-inch margins; and should not exceed 12 numbered pages. If the Proposal Narrative fails to comply with these length restrictions, [Insert PO] may consider such noncompliance in peer review and in final award decision. Applicants may include tables, charts, and graphs in a legible font smaller than 12-point but they will still be considered part of the page limit.

The Proposal Narrative must include the following sections:

a. Description of the Issue

Describe why this project/these proposed activities are necessary (significance/value) or address a need. Include supporting information.

b. Project Design and Implementation

Describe the strategy to address the needs identified in the Description of the Issue. List the activities and describe how they relate to the stated objectives. Activities are the specific actions to be undertaken to fulfill the program's objectives and reach the program's goal(s). Provide a detailed description of the method(s) to be used to carry out each activity. Provide a timetable indicating roughly when the activities or program milestones are to be accomplished.

c. Capabilities and Competencies

Describe the capabilities and competencies required to accomplish the goals and objectives of the project.

d. Plan for Collecting the Data Required for this Solicitation's Performance Measures

Describe the process for measuring project performance. Identify who will collect the data; who is responsible for performance measurements; and how the information will be used to guide and evaluate the project's impact. Describe the process to accurately report data.

Note: An applicant is **not** required to submit performance data with the application. Rather, performance measure information is included as a notification that award recipients will be required to submit performance data as part of each award's reporting requirements. Some measures are presented as examples, while others are the exact measures that every recipient will be expected to address.

OJP will require each award recipient to submit regular performance data that show the completed work's results. The performance data directly relate to the goals, objectives, and deliverables identified in the "Goals, Objectives, and Deliverables" discussion.
