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Who May Apply:	State, local, and tribal enforcement and prosecutions agencies			
Why Apply:	Receive funding to support conducting outreach, educating practitioners and the public, enhancing victim reporting tools, and investigating and prosecuting hate crimes.			
Maximum per Award:	<ul> <li>Up to \$725,000 for Category 1</li> <li>Up to \$2,000,000 for Category 2</li> <li>Up to \$150,000 for Category 3</li> </ul>			
BJA encourages the following entities to apply:	<ul> <li>Agencies that have not previously received BJA funding.</li> <li>Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities.</li> </ul>			
Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:	<ul> <li>Build strong collaboration between law enforcement, prosecution, and community- based organizations.</li> <li>Establish state and regionwide coordinated efforts to prevent, identify, and investigate hate crimes.</li> <li>Create comprehensive approaches that expand strategies to increase the reporting, identification, and charging of hate crimes.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Enhance the capacity of law enforcement and prosecutors to prevent and address hate crimes.</li> <li>Increase trust and confidence in state, local, and tribal justice partners to be able to identify, investigate, and prosecute hate crimes.</li> <li>Implement an action plan resulting in the prosecution and resolution of cases.</li> </ul>

How to apply and when:	Submit a two-step application.				
	(1)Register in <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by August 1, 2024.				
	(2)Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by July 25, 2024. The application's major elements are:				
	(a) The <b>proposal abstract</b> that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).				
	(b) The <b>proposal narrative</b> that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.				
	(c) The <b>web-based budget</b> form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
