

# FY25 DNA CAPACITY ENHANCEMENT FOR BACKLOG REDUCTION (CEBR) – COMPETITIVE GRANTS PROGRAM

### Who may apply:

City or township, county, or state governments; public and state-controlled institutions of higher education with an existing crime laboratory that conducts DNA analysis of samples for entry into the FBI's Combined DNA Index System (CODIS).

### Why Apply:

Apply for Competitive CEBR funding to solve crimes and protect public safety by maximizing the effective utilization of DNA technology to process DNA samples for entry into CODIS. Funds can be used to increase capacity and/or efficiency of laboratories to process crime scene samples for CODIS or to support implementation of Rapid DNA in the booking environment.

### Maximum per award:

- Up to \$1,000,000 per award.

### BJA encourages the following entities to apply:

- Agencies that have not previously received BJA funding.
- Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities.

### Examples of strategies/activities that can be funded:

- Increase laboratory capacity and efficiency to process CODIS eligible crime scene samples.
- Purchase/implement new and more efficient instruments/robotics to automate routine laboratory processing steps.
- Evaluate, validate, and implement improved laboratory procedures.
- Implement Rapid DNA in the Booking Environment.

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## How to apply and when:

Submit a two-step application.

1. Register in [Grants.gov](https://grants.gov) and follow the prompts to submit the SF-424 form by October 22, 2025.
2. Then complete the full application in [JustGrants.usdoj.gov](https://JustGrants.usdoj.gov) by October 29, 2025. The application's major elements are:
  - a. The **proposal abstract** that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).
  - b. The **proposal narrative** that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.
  - c. The **web-based budget** form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
